Program Learning Outcomes:

When English Language Learners finish our program, they should be able to function communicatively as members of the Dixie State University community.

Catalog Description:

Designed to give students a basic foundation in listening comprehension and conversation. The course will offer guided conversations, which engage students in meaningful conversations with carefully structured grammar. In addition, the course will offer all-skills language practice in listening, speaking, reading, writing and pronunciation. Prerequisite: COMPASS ESL combined score 36-56 or ESL 0111 (Grade B or higher).

A grade of B (83%) or better is required to move to the next level.

Quizzes, mid term presentation, final presentation, and final exam include oral speaking and listening comprehension elements. The oral production portions of the mid term and final assessments is comprised of half in class conversation and presentations, and half from the suggested test elements.

Homework & Participation: Homework is assigned daily and is due at the <u>beginning</u> of the next class. All of the assignments will be used in class the following day, so it will also strengthen your participation score. Absenteeism is no excuse for not having the homework done on time. Participation every day is expected and will help you to learn English. *Both are important as practice for presentations and exams*.

Quizzes and Presentations: There will be Quizzes and/or Presentations as scheduled (see "Semester Schedule" below). If a presentation is missed, a zero will be recorded which can be removed by doing the "make up presentation" for one time. If <u>more than one presentation</u> is missed, a zero will be received for the additional missed presentation (s). If an emergency arises on presentation day, call or email me to explain ASAP (as soon as possible). Leaving a telephone message will not be enough.

Mid-Term & Final Presentations and Exams: There will be Presentations at Midterm and during the week before Final Exams. A comprehensive spoken Final Exam will be taken in accordance with DSU's exam schedule. **Your final exam is May 1, 9:30-11:30.** Students must honor the exam schedule. To request an exception, petition me and the department chairman with the correct form and a 250-word explanation.

Class Structure: Missing class means missing critical discussions and assignment explanations, and possibly quizzes or presentations for which a zero will be recorded. Avoid unnecessary absences.

Dishonesty: Dishonesty will not be tolerated in any form. Any student cheating on an assignment or test (giving or receiving information) will receive a zero for that test. **If you bought a used book, erase all previous responses**. If you cheat and are not caught, it does not mean that you "beat the system." It means you violated the Student Code, forfeited your integrity, and did not learn the material. Attendance Policy:

- 1. Make every effort to attend classes, but missing up to 2 classes will NOT change your grade. After that, you will begin to lose points.
- 2. Three late arrivals of five minutes or less will result in one absence. (3 late arrivals = 1 absence)
- 3. Late arrivals <u>over five minutes</u> is marked as an absence. (But come anyway to learn, improve your Participation score, and not "fall behind".)
- 4. Every absence (or combination of late arrivals) over 3 classes results in a 1% drop in your Final Grade.
