COURSE FORMAT:

This course is designed to help students improve their English skills through technology.

COURSE DESCRIPTION:

The course is designed to help ESL students strengthen their speaking, pronunciation, listening, vocabulary, grammar and reading comprehension. The prerequisite for the course is a COMPASS ESL combined score of 36-50, or ESL 0165 (grade B or higher). This course does not provide GE credit but it does affect grade average.

Rosetta Stone Classroom

The course uses Rosetta Stone language software.

TEACHING and COURSE OUTCOMES:

The objectives of this course are to improve English skills in reading, writing, speaking (pronunciation), vocabulary and listening (related to Program Learning Outcomes 1-4—see below). The lab provides general language practice at the individual student's level and pace. The goal of the course is to help the student advanced one level on the Rosetta Stone software.

Grading Policy

- Attendance: You will earn 2 points for every class period attended. If you are more than 10 minutes late, 1 point will be deducted from your attendance for that day. (60 points possible)
- Word Work (WW): You will fill out a form each class period to share what you are learning. You will earn 1 point for each form you complete. (28 points possible)
- **Midterm and Final Conferences:** For midterm and final you will meet with the instructor for an oral (spoken) conference. This will be to evaluate your English language progression and pronunciation. Each conference is worth **2 points**. **(4 points possible)**

Students will be able to earn up to 43 points by midterm and 92 points by the final class period. Grades will be determined by total number of points earned. The grade breakdown is as follows.

PROGRAM OUTCOMES:

When English Language Learners finish our program, they should be able to function communicatively as members of the Dixie State University community.
