## **Course Description:**

For intermediate-level students who have taken JAPN 2010. Continued emphasis on communicative competence. Grammatical structures will be reviewed, conversation will be emphasized, and reading and writing will receive increased focus, as well as cultural awareness. A variety of teaching methods are employed, including drills, videos, conversational activities, reading, and lecture. This course partially qualifies students to receive an Associate of Arts or Bachelor of Arts degree. Placement in foreign language classes is at the discretion of the Department Chair. 4 lecture hours per week.

Prerequisite: JAPN 2010 or instructor permission.

#### **Vertical Credit:**

Students passing this intermediate class with a grade of C or better may receive vertical credits for Japanese 1010, 1020, and 2010 (12 credits), if credits for these classes have not already been received. These credits do not have a grade assigned. These credits cannot be awarded until the final grades have been calculated; therefore, the process for obtaining the credits will be explained prior to the end of the semester. The cost of these vertical credits is \$5 per credit and there is a posting fee of about \$25 for these credits.

#### Method of Instruction:

This course is conducted in both English and Japanese. Lectures on grammar, vocabulary, and culture, are conducted in English whereas the speaking activities require students to use Japanese as much as possible. Students will also learn the language through visual media, class discussion, practice in small groups, and guest speaker(s). In addition, social and cultural activities relevant to this course will be introduced to make learning more interesting.

## Student Learning Outcomes:

Upon the successful completion of this course, students will be able to:

- Communicate more spontaneously both casually and formally.
- 2) Express ideas and opinions on familiar topics and events in the present and past in a culturally appropriate way.
- Manage frequently used structures and vocabulary accurately.
- 4) Recognize, read, and write additional kanji and their compounds.
- 5) Compose documents using three writing systems in a cohesive paragraph.
- 6) Scan for the general meaning in authentic or semi-authentic materials, and extract detail from complex sentences in various texts such as letters, essays, and compositions.

## 🐿 Important Study Guidelines

In learning languages, you have to study in a consistent manner. You need to prepare before class, review after class, and practice on a daily basis.

Before Class: In order to facilitate the learning process, go over grammar notes and vocabulary list and get some idea about what you will be learning in class.

#### After Class:

- (1) Review what you learned in class by carefully reading grammar notes and example sentences.
- (2) Memorize new vocabulary and learn how to use them in context. (Tip: make flash cards)
- (3) Begin grammar and writing exercises in the textbook.
- (4) Listen to dialogues and imitate the models. (Tip: pay attention to pronunciation and intonation)
- (5) Study 3 to 4 kanji a day. (Tip: read aloud kanji compounds and practice writing kanji.)

## **Course Requirements:**

Due to the cumulative nature of language learning, students are expected to attend and participate in class regularly and keep up with the course work on a daily basis. Preparation and active participation are essential to improve your language skills. It is your responsibility to check with the upcoming assignments and due dates. Any changes/adjustments will be announced in class and via email.

## 1. Class Attendance & Participation 出席 (15%)

Active participation is essential to improve your language skills. Class attendance and active participation are mandatory. Each absence will result in 1 point deduction of your attendance points. Without a valid documented excuse, 5 absences will automatically reduce the highest possible final grade to "C", and 10 absences will give you an "F" for the course. You will lose a half point for each time you come late or leave class early without any notice. Meanwhile, students with perfect attendance will receive an extra 3% added to your final grade.



Texting, tweeting, and Internet browsing (including Facebook) are not allowed during class and will be penalized a half point each time.

## 2. Homework Assignments 宿題 (20%)

Homework assignments will be mostly from *Genki Workbook*, and collected at the beginning of the class. Do not do it during class! No point will be given for homework completed during class. Late and/or incomplete assignments will receive a lower grade.

There will be a hefty penalty of 20% for the homework submitted one class late, and of 50% for a homework submitted one week late. Homework submitted more than one week after the due date will be corrected but earn **NO** points!

You can review what we learned in class by doing homework assignments. I recommend that you invent an effective way to organize your homework and develop good study skills and habits. Each homework assignment from the workbook is worth **10 points**. In your homework assignments, be sure to use kanji we studied in class. You will receive lower points if your homework has blanks or too many errors and if you don't use kanji we studied.

## 3. Quizzes クイズ (30%)

Quizzes will be given weekly throughout the semester based on new vocabulary, kanji, and grammar. There will be <u>NO</u> make up for missed quizzes. But, the lowest quiz score will be dropped at the end of the semester.

- b. Japanese comic strip presentation (create comic strips which include at least 10 meaningful sentences in Japanese along with graphics)
- c. Japanese children's book presentations (choose a story and memorize at least 10 sentences)
- d. Skit presentation (Choose your partner and present in Japanese.)
